The AEAJ is the only aromatherapy-related public service corporation that is recognized as such by the Cabinet Office.


The AEAJ's activities include promotion, research and study of aromatherapy with the goal of contributing to people's mental and physical health through aromatherapy that uses plant fragrances.



- How to Try Aromas
- 1. Grab the top of the glass dome (the round protrusion) and gently lift it up.
- 2. Slowly draw your nose close to the open glass dome and enjoy the aroma inside.



5 AEAJ Recycling Boxes

- Requests before and during collection
- Clean essential oil bottles with anhydrous ethanol and bring with you.
- Separate bottles into lid, inner lid (dropper), and bottle parts, and put them in the recycling box.
- If you have trouble removing the inner lid (dropper), please use the spatula provided.



Recycled Art Work

"Reafs" are works of botanical-themed art created by recycling collected essential oil bottles. One reaf is made from one essential oil bottle, and can be used as an aroma diffuser.


Please do not touch any of the works.

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AROMA LABORATORY

You can try fragrances of essential oils collected from all over the world. We have over 30 kinds of Japanese essential oils*.

* Essential oils extracted from plants that have long grown in Japan, such as Shiso (perilla) and Hamanasu (Japanese rose).



Try the fragrances, and also search for detailed information on essential oils in our original database.



Display shelves

You can try fragrances from more than 100 essential oils. Types and numbers of essential oils are changed regularly.

Note!

You can use the number on the top of each lid to search the database.



In the drawers

Mouillettes (test papers) scented with over 130 essential oils are free to take home.

Note!

The mouillette design is based on the motif of the annual ring of the cypress tree – the symbol of AEAJ Green Terrace.

Pick up the glass container with your hand and remove the lid to try the Remove



AEAJ Green Terrace Features of its construction

Based on the concept of "a small forest in Jingumae," we created a space where you can experience a forest even in the heart of the city, by using a wooden structure scented with cypress and lighting resembling

The AEAJ Green Terrace was designed by architect Kengo Kuma, whose designs impress by using wood in a variety of ways, in order to contribute to people's mental and physical health and to be a symbol for AEAJ's activities to conserve and create aromatic environments. The design applies the traditional Japanese architectural technique of kigumi (wood joinery), using as few steel frames as possible and maximizing the use of domestic materials such as Japanese cypress, chestnut, and larch.

Efficacy of Wood Use for Preventing Global Warming

- Wood emits less CO₂ during production than concrete or steel.
- Trees absorb a great deal of CO₂ during growth and continue to store carbon even after becoming timber.
